
Collaborative Leadership

Professional development


- Fosters and inspires professional learning that its ongoing and focuses on student learning, the goals of teachers, and school community
- Feedback
 - Fosters growth in stakeholders and leaders
- Family engagement
 - Fosters a collaborative relationship between staff and parents with students at the center

Addressing within School Variance

- Shift the Narrative
- Agree what a year's progress looks like
- Expect a year's worth of progress
- Develop new assessment and evaluation tools to provide teacher feedback
- Ensure teachers have expertise in diagnosis, interventions and evaluation
- Meet, model, motivate to scale up success
- Link autonomy to a year's progress

Instructional Leadership

- Creating an inclusive, safe and engaging school climate
- Being visible & engaging
- Collaborative Leader/Instructional Coach
- Exploring data collaboratively
- Focusing on learning
- Communication high & appropriate academic expectations for all

Collective Teacher Efficacy

- Provide PD that is co-constructed with staff
- Create building level stakeholder group
- Co-construct, or encourage staff, to create their own professional goal (feedback, PD)
- Encourage & require staff to share best practices


There is extensive research that shows school climate having a profound impact on students' mental and physical health. Thapa et al. 2012

Fostering teacher efficacy leads to more inclusive and supportive school climate, which leads to teachers who encourage more efficacy to their students.


Professional Development
