Strengths

- Welcoming school cultures
- Passionate, committed staff
- Strong relationships among stakeholders
- Culture of inclusion
- Intimate learning environments offer an increased opportunity for student engagement
- Openness and willingness to change



Challenges

- Lack of common mission
- Ensure least restrictive environment for special education students
- Inconsistent referral process
- Lack of continuum of care at the middle school level
- Negative program stigma



Recommendations and Priorities

- Develop a vision and mission
- Ensure equitable accessibility
- Create clear program and goals with consistent benchmarks for entrance and exits
- Provide high-quality programming
